Duke Benefits Enrollment Center will help low-income individuals find benefits available for them. Using webbased tools and person-centered approaches, the Benefits Enrollment Center help low-income seniors and applicants with disabilities find and enroll in all the benefits programs for which they are eligible, and create coordinated, community-wide systems of benefits access. The BECs focus on connecting people to these core benefits: Medicare Part D Extra Help/Low-Income Subsidy (LIS), the Medicare Savings Programs, Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP - formerly known as Food Stamps), the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program, among others.

BECs are supported with funding from the Medicare Improvements for Patients and Providers Act (MIPPA), administered through the U.S. Administration for Community Living (ACL). Since their inception in 2009, the BECs have helped over 650,000 individuals identify more than \$589 million in benefits they were eligible for, but missing out on. Duke University Division of Community Health has launched a new Benefits Enrollment Center, covering Durham, Person and Granville counties. NC ID Card - No-Fee Program: After January 1, 2014, you will be able to apply for a free NC identification card to be used for voting (but can be used for ID purposes). To qualify, you will need to:

- Prove your age and identity.
- Prove your NC residency.
- Be registered to vote in North Carolina.
- Not have a valid driver license.

Wheelchairs: (2 special kinds are listed below)

1. Senior Wheels USA information provided by: Durham System of Care; 800-246-6010; www.seniorwheelsusa.com; works to help seniors and people with disabilities prepare paperwork for getting a medically necessary power wheelchair (your physician will need to sign a prescription for your wheelchair); no income guidelines, but in order to get the wheelchair free of charge must have Medicare Part B or private insurance (HMO patients, or those in hospice care or living in nursing homes are ineligible); the goal of Senior Wheels USA is to help those regain mobility in their homes because they've lost the ability to walk unaided and can't manipulate a manual wheelchair; people not meeting all program requirements might be able to get a donated wheelchair. Call and leave your name and phone number so that a case manager can call you back.

2. Shower Buddy information provided by: Durham System of Care; 877-769-2833; www.myshowerbuddy.com; distributes a special ergonomic wheelchair that enables the user to transfer from bed to chair to shower or bathtub, with less effort and only one transfer; special seat enables user to roll over to and position that seat above the toilet for use without transferring to the toilet seat.
